2014 Anaperenna 94 Points

Anaperenna is never about half measures. This is warm with alcohol and high in oak influence, but the fruit is rich and boisterous and the tannin a wave worth watching. It's a wine of both concerns and copious compensations. Chocolate and blackberry, black earth and salted licorice. You get what you came for, and then some.

A blend of 76% Shiraz and 24% Cabernet Sauvignon, the deep garnet-purple colored 2014 Shiraz Cabernet Anaperenna has a nose of crème de cassis, plum preserves, blackberry coulis and chocolate box with hints of cigar boxes and baking spices. Big, opulent and voluptuously fruited in the mouth, it has nice ripe, velvety tannins and just enough acid to frame the generous fruit, finishing with great length and plenty of freshness.

Dark purple. Pungent black and blue fruits, oak spices, potpourri and woodsmoke on the highly perfumed nose. The palate displays very good clarity and energy, with tangy acidity adding lift and cut to the sweet boysenberry, violet pastille and vanilla flavors. This smooth, sappy, gently tannic blend finishes with harmonious tannins and lingering smokiness.

2014 Anaperenna, awarded **GOLD MEDAL – TROPHY FOR BEST SHIRAZ DOMINANT BLEND**

The 2014 Glaetzer Anaperenna Shiraz Cabernet is the proud winner of the “Best Shiraz Dominant Blend” Trophy and a gold medal in the 2015 awards that celebrate 10 years of the competition. This result has particular significance linking back to the competition's first year in 2006 when the 2004 Glaetzer Godolphin Shiraz Cabernet (renamed Anaperenna since the 2006 vintage) was the overall winning wine of the first Great Australian Red competition.
